

MAKE SACRIFICES, SAYS T. R.

Tells Red Cross Every Man Physically Fit Should Take Arms.

GARDEN CITY, L. I., May 14.—Colonel Theodore Roosevelt told 300 persons in the Garden City Hotel tonight at the opening of the drive of the Nassau County Chapter of the Red Cross for a fund of \$300,000 that only the men in uniform were called upon to make the supreme sacrifice for the country and that the soldiers were the only American citizens who should have no regret that they were not doing their utmost for the safety of the nation.

"No citizen should be content unless he is making some sacrifice to aid in the conduct of the war," said Colonel Roosevelt. "The only man who should have no regret over his part is the man in uniform. He is the only citizen called upon to make the supreme sacrifice. It is the duty of every citizen to buy bonds to aid the prosecution of the war and to aid in the great work of the Red Cross.

"It is fifty years since the American people have been called upon to make a supreme sacrifice for the perpetuation of the nation, and the struggle then was in just as great a cause as this struggle against German efforts to enslave the world. It will be a triple shame if the American people of this

day fall short of the great record of the men and women who saw the civil war through to the end.

"If we don't win this war we will have another with the same armies on this side of the Atlantic and we will have to fight it without the aid of allies. We must see this war through to victory whatever the sacrifice or the losses we sustain. It is the duty of every American to fight the German, and no man physically fit should remain out of the army when the country needs him."

Colonel Roosevelt is to talk in several villages in Nassau County to aid the Red Cross drive.

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
