

COLONEL FOR "KNOCKOUT."

**Wants the War Carried to Berlin—
One Language for America.**

DES MOINES, May 27.—English as the sole language for schools, newspapers, and other usage in this country, was urged by Theodore Roosevelt in an address here tonight, under the direction of the National Security League.

The former President reiterated his contention for universal obligatory military training, and pointed out "our duty to speed up the war and it through," and "so to prepare ourselves that the peace we are to gain shall be a permanent gain for righteousness."

"We have put our hand to the plow," he shouted, "and we will never turn back until we have driven the furrow up to Berlin. Unless we knock out Germany, we will have to fight again probably within the lifetime of men now old, certainly within the time of those now Young."

In voicing his approval of the recent proclamation by Governor Harding, ordering that English be the only medium of instruction in public or private schools in Iowa, Colonel Roosevelt said:

"This is a nation—not a polyglot boarding house. There is not room in the country for any fifty-fifty American. There can be but one loyalty—to the Stars and Stripes; one nationality—the American—and therefore only one language—the English language."
