

ROOSEVELT URGES ALL TO HELP WIN WAR

*Women Must Do Their Part as
Well as Men, He Tells
Maine Audience.*

DARK HARBOR, Me., Aug. 4.—Former President Roosevelt came out of the seclusion of his vacation retreat here on the Maine coast to deliver a stirring patriotic address today. From every Summer resort within automobile or motorboat distance guests and natives flocked to this town to give the Colonel a greeting.

Standing on a platform under the pine trees, with the flags of all the nations allied against Germany draped about him, he urged the audience to put all they had into the winning of the war.

"We are at the crisis of civilization," he said. "It is for all men and women in America to decide whether they shall hold their heads high or whether they shall so act as never again to be able to look into the faces of those men of ours overseas. The place for men of fighting age is on the fighting line. The place for men who are not able to fight is to make it possible for some one else to fight.

"And you mothers, wives, and sisters, it is your place to bear your burdens cheerfully, and to make it easy for the boys over there. Unless you want to know anxiety such as the fathers, mothers, sisters, brothers, and husbands in Belgium have felt for four years, and are feeling now, you must do your part to the utmost to win this war. The opportunity is all about you at this minute. There is the Red Cross, the Liberty Loan, the War Savings Stamp, and the innumerable other necessary activities."

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
