

# COLUMBUS HEARS COLONEL.

## Roosevelt Speaks for Liberty Loan at Dedication Exercises.

COLUMBUS, Ohio, Sept. 30.—Universal obligatory service—military, social, and industrial—for both men and women, deportation of conscientious objectors, dealing of a knockout blow to the Central Powers while they are "groggy," and full preparedness after the war, were urged by former President Theodore Roosevelt in an address today opening the Fourth Liberty Loan drive and dedicating the memorial arch to Franklin County's soldier and sailor dead.

Colonel Roosevelt said only those persons are fit to live here who are fit to die for their country, and that "the man who loves America and some other country also is like the man who loves his wife, but other women more."

"If America had been prepared," Mr. Roosevelt said, "the war would have been over ninety days after this country entered it. "We are paying the price of unpreparedness," he added. "What we want to do is to remain prepared so no nation will dare look cross-eyed at us."

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
